Christian Aid Talk given at the Churches Together in South Bedford Service 2010

(A talk based on John Ch 14: v23-29, Revelation Ch 21 v1-6, Ch 22 v1-5 and information supplied by Christian Aid)

I think that many of you know that I enjoy caravanning. However, as I have got older I have become more particular about the sites I will use! In the early years, a tap and a hole in the ground were all I needed. But nowadays, if the toilet block isn't heated then I will want to move on to another site with better facilities!

However, I do know that the slums of Nairobi contain toilets which I would be extremely reluctant to use - I'm not at all keen on balancing on a couple of planks over a hole in the ground, especially if the muddy ground is slippery, as it would be in the rainy season. This means that I can quite understand why some people use what are called flying toilets - you use a plastic bag and then throw it away, preferably onto someone else's land!

I feel sure that if some of the people from the slums of Nairobi could use the toilets I prefer to use, then they would think that they were in paradise! And then they would no doubt want to think about how such facilities could be made available to them in their home town. They would be filled with what we could call a vision for change.

In the passage from St John's gospel, the focus is on a significant point in Jesus' ministry. Here, Jesus was trying to get his followers to understand what would happen after his suffering on the cross and how he would continue to help and support them through the power of the Holy Spirit. He stressed that those who love him would also keep his word Jesus - in other words, they would love God and their neighbour, and that they would be helped to do this by the support which they would get from the Holy Spirit.

In the passage from the Book of Revelation, the emphasis is on the completion of the perfect kingdom which has become possible through Christ's redemptive work. It is a kingdom which is both now and also yet to come. The city is a perfect society, one which is large and also open to all, a place without pain, death and suffering. It's a place where God and people can live together because there is nothing to spoil their relationship, or the relationship between people. And that city would be full of abundant health, with reference being made to 'the spring of the water of life', 'the river of life' and 'the tree with leaves for the healing of the nations'.

If we think about the vision of following the teachings of Jesus, which we had in our gospel reading, and the promise of fulfilment of his rule of love and justice which are in Revelation, then we cannot help but be challenged when we hear about life in the slums of Nairobi. The question we are faced with is 'What can we do to help our neighbour?'

Christian Aid Week always falls in the liturgical season of Easter - when we celebrate the sure and certain hope which Jesus has won for us. And, when we think about it, the suffering of people in the slums of Nairobi reminds us of the suffering of Jesus on the cross. But, Christ's resurrection tells us that there is not only an alternative vision, but also another end to the story, and that if we can get involved in the story of sacrifice, then there is abundant life to be found.

If we have no vision about what we can do, then we are quite likely to fall into despair. However, if we have vision without action, without doing something, then we have fantasy. But it's when we have vision and action, it is then that we are starting to play our part in

bringing the kingdom of heaven to earth. The vision of a world without pain and suffering, which we find in Revelation, is not just a hope for the future, but is a challenge for us now, something to aim for.

Christian Aid believes that we can bring poverty to an end, and our resurrection faith leads us to believe that what might seem impossible can, and must, happen. The people living in the slums of Nairobi know that such change can happen - new toilets have been built in part of their area - and the work is needed to continue. The hope of change is something solid, and all it needs is merely the commitment of others for it to happen.

Well, how can we bring this change about? The answer is simple: through sacrificial love. As Christians we have been challenged to follow Jesus' teachings - to love as Jesus loves. We see in Jesus' life, ministry, and his passion his absolute love for us. And while Jesus was living on this earth he showed a great compassion for poor and marginalized people. The passage in John's gospel comes shortly after his washing of the feet of his disciples, and the message is clear - this is how we are to love; this is how we are to follow. Love doesn't shy away from the unclean, unpleasant and unsanitary things of the world: it drives us to respond to them through transforming love.

It's very difficult for us to love as Christ loves, but we have been given the Holy Spirit to support us. Through the Holy Spirit's life in us, and through us, we can become changed, empowered and enabled. We can become filled with the power of the Holy Spirit and so full of love, peace, kindness, and patience.

Christian Aid is not embarrassed to ask us to do something to show that we are followers of Jesus, and it can help us to work for a vision of a changed and renewed world.

The question is: are we thirsty for change? Are we ready to rise to the challenge that is before us? The challenge is large, there's a lot to be done. But could it be that what stands in our way is not the size of the problem, but the size of our thirst for change?

As the Christian Aid supporters who visited Kenya have reported: "very small sacrifices can make a huge change possible."

It's up to us: the challenge is there, and we could provide toilets in Nairobi which everyone would be happy to use!

BRING ON THE BBQ!

It's this time of year when everyone likes to wheel out the BBQ, get the charcoal smoking nicely and grill up an outdoor feast, but if you're planning a BBQ this summer, here are some safety tips to bear in mind - and a recipe to get you started!

BBQ SAFETY:

Make sure your barbecue is in good working order. Ensure the barbecue is on a flat site, well away from a shed, trees or shrubs.

Keep children, garden games and pets well away from the cooking area.

Never leave the barbecue unattended.

Keep a bucket of water or sand nearby for emergencies.

Ensure the barbecue is cool before attempting to move it.

Charcoal Barbecues

Use only enough charcoal to cover the base to a depth of about 50mm (2 inches).

Only use recognised fire lighters or starter fuel and only on cold coals - use the minimum necessary and never use petrol.

Never put hot ashes straight into a dustbin or wheelie bin - they could melt the plastic and cause a fire.

Gas Barbecues

Make sure the tap is turned off before changing the gas cylinder.

Change cylinders outdoors if possible or in a well ventilated area.

If you suspect a leak to the cylinder or pipe work, brush soapy water around the joints and watch for bubbles - tighten to fix but do not overtighten.

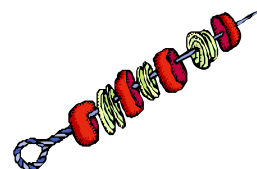
After cooking, turn off the gas cylinder before turning off at the controls to ensure any residual gas in the pipe work is used up.

BBQ RECIPE:

4 wooden skewers

4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, cut into 2.5cm cubes

Oil, for brushing



250ml coconut milk

1 mild red chilli, deseeded and sliced

Grated zest and juice of 1 lime

3cm piece root ginger, grated

Place 12 wooden skewers in cold water and leave them to soak for 30 minutes. Stir together the ingredients for the marinade and tip into a shallow dish. Add the chicken cubes, mix well, cover and chill for 25 minutes. Remove the chicken and discard the marinade. Remove the skewers from the water and pat dry. Divide into twelve piles and thread the cubes onto the skewers. Brush with oil and barbecue over direct medium heat for 8 to 10 minutes, or until the chicken is cooked through, turning once.
